Current depth: 11,000 meters into a fracturing global order. Beneath the soil, the layers do not mix; they stack. An unexploded German bomb, a Pepsi-Cola cap, and the frozen sediment of a centuries-old river exist in a state of absolute, synchronized claustrophobia.

In an alternative yet deeply familiar present, Konstantin Molot works in the deepest skyscraper in the world on Red Square. At the "Institute for Biological Structures," he is responsible for preserving Lenin's corpse (ВИЛ24) and secretly steals tissue samples for his oligarch godfather, Boris Bogdanov. Meanwhile, his younger sister, Lada, smuggles the samples to Germany on a sheer endless bus ride from Kiev to Berlin. When she cannot sleep at night, she passes the time by spelling out German words using Cyrillic letters—a linguistic manipulation that causes the words to become hollow. The siblings have long lost touch; Lada cannot understand why her brother stayed in Moscow after the war began, therefore she is entirely unaware that Boris is putting them both in a tight spot.

LENINGRAD

Traumatized by the hunger unto death in the Siege of Leningrad, Jelena Jerschowa—a former colleague of Boris's mother and the mother of one of Konstantin's co-workers—molds her survival anxiety into dough. She relentlessly feeds her son homemade pirogi laced with structural additives: a pinch of fluorine, a grain of soda, a drop of sleeping aids. She continues this tradition decades later: Jewgeni distributes the pirogi to his colleagues at the Moscow institute, utterly unaware that they now contain harmful neurotoxins and heavy metals.

Over the following years, she worked as a psychiatric nurse in the Ruhr area until she began studying Literary Writing at the German Literature Institute Leipzig in 2020. Today, she takes care of people with addiction issues in Lüdenscheid – and writes.

On the love for a difficult father and one's way into life

"Moth" is what the father calls the narrator. The father is a worker, gambler, and a drinker. In fact, Moth even has two fathers: one who can run fast, knows all the hiding places when playing, and comes up with an answer to any question. And the other, who is transferred from the factory to the office so he doesn't drunkenly saw off his hand. And about the alcohol, the mother says, it was actually the same with all the men in the family.

Moth herself has long been drinking more than is good for her. Even as a child, she played waitress at the local fair festival and drank the leftovers until she felt warm. Now, as a young woman, she sometimes sleeps in the hallway because she can no longer fit the key into the lock. Her boyfriend supports her, but he usually can't stand properly himself. Only her brother, who has become an educator, checks on her every day. When her father is diagnosed with terminal cancer, Moth looks for a way to say goodbye – to her father and to alcohol.

Father's Hands by Lena Schätze is a moving novel about growing up in a family living in so-called modest circumstances, which, when it comes down to it, sticks together. A tough, tender novel about the love for a difficult father and the path to life.

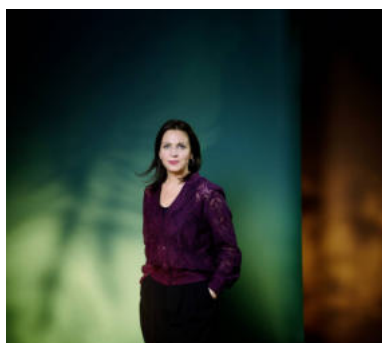

Jarka Kubsova was born in 1977 in the former Czechoslovakia and has lived in Germany since 1987. She has worked as a journalist, ghostwriter and co-author of several successful non-fiction books. Her debut novel, *Bergland*, was published in 2021, followed in 2023 by the novel *Marshlands*, which was nominated for the Independent Bookshops' Favourite Book award and adapted for the stage. Jarka Kubsova lives in Hamburg.

Annika Büsing (born 1981) lives with her family in Bochum and teaches at a secondary school. In 2022, she won the German Youth Literature Prize, the Ruhr Literature Prize and the Mara Cassens Prize for her acclaimed debut novel *Nordstadt*. She was also nominated for the Bavarian Book Prize, the Blogger Prize "Das Debüt" and the Debut Prize of the Harbour Front Literature Festival. With *Koller*, she made it onto the lists for the Evangelical Book Prize and the "Das zweite Buch" prize. Both novels have been adapted for the theatre. Her third novel, *Wir kommen zurecht* (*We're Getting By*), was published by Steidl in spring 2025.

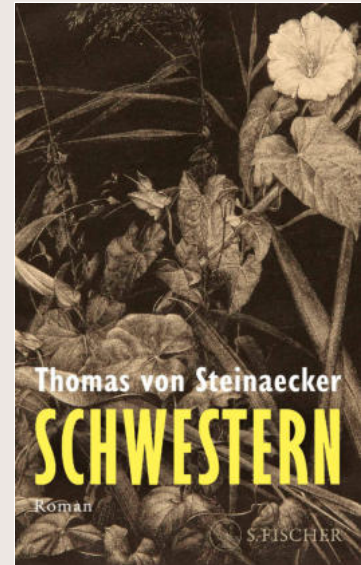
Ingo Schulze was born in Dresden in 1962 and lives in Berlin. His books, including *Simple Stories*, *New Lives*, *Adam and Evelyn*, *Peter Holtz* and *The Righteous Murderers*, have been hugely successful, are set on school reading lists, have been made into films and translated into 32 languages. Ingo Schulze has received numerous national and international awards for his work. He has been President of the German Academy for Language and Literature since 2023.

A hidden love story and the beginnings of writing.

Invited to a reading from his unfinished manuscript, the narrator travels to Mecklenburg in June 2025. This lake-rich landscape is the very place he called "the North" in the summer of 1979, the period his text is about. An unexpected encounter seems to bring his novella to life, raising the question of what was and what really is. Was he too young and too carefree for true love back then, and is it too late now? Have only illusions and utopias been lost, or also the aspirations and hopes that are missing from a present in which the old fear of war seems real once more? Perhaps the love story in *Water in August* is also a school of seeing, of recognising and of writing, and an attempt to come to terms with the world, with people and with one's own history as accurately and vividly as possible.

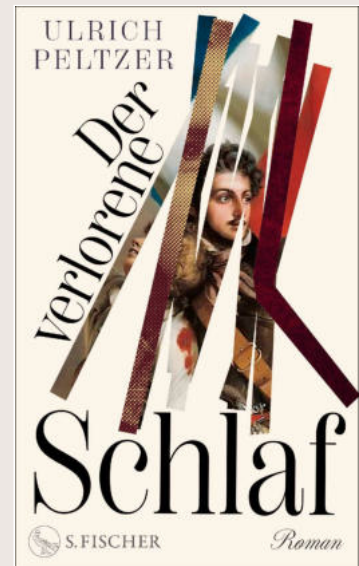

He also directs documentary films, including works on Werner Herzog and Rainer Maria Rilke. His most recent publications are the novel *The Privileged* (2023) and the non-fiction book *Open End – The Book of Failed Artworks* (2021).

His most recent novel was *The Seriousness of Life* (2024). Ulrich Peltzer lives in Berlin and Cologne.

Revolution, passion and a deadly duel – Ulrich Peltzer tells the story of the famous mathematician Évariste Galois.

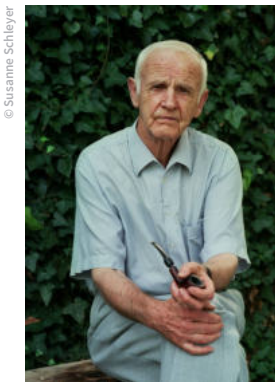
Günter de Bruyn

Günter de Bruyn, born in Berlin in 1926, lived in Görzsdorf near Beeskow as a freelance writer from 1969 onwards. He was awarded numerous prizes, including the Heinrich Böll Prize and the Thomas Mann Prize. His most important works include *Zwischenbilanz* and *Vierzig Jahre*, *Buridan's Donkey* and *Als Poesie gut*. Günter de Bruyn died on 4 October 2020 in Bad Saarow.

On his 100th birthday – Günter de Bruyn's last great narrative work.

Günter de Bruyn's last completed work takes us to historic Berlin during the Gründerzeit period and to the Spreewald landscape. It is an astonishing retelling of Wilhelm Bölsche's 1891 novel *Die Mittagsgöttin* (*The Midday Goddess*).

Günter de Bruyn masterfully evokes the atmosphere of an era between the Enlightenment and belief in spirits, progress and spiritualism. He tells of love, betrayal and the uncovering of a great deception. And the more evocatively de Bruyn delves into the past, the more one gets the feeling that the book is also about the conspiracy nonsense of our present day.

Jan-Pieter Barbian, Siegfried Lokatis

Paths through the German Catastrophe. S. Fischer Verlag 1930 to 1952

Jan-Pieter Barbian has analysed National Socialist cultural policy in his standard work on the 'Literary Policy of the Nazi State' and in numerous essays. From 1999 to 2025, he was director of the Duisburg City Library.

Siegfried Lokatis taught as a professor of publishing studies at the University of Leipzig from 2006 to 2022, where he established the Bibliotop and published numerous studies and books on publishing history in East and West Germany.

The eventful history of the only Jewish publishing house that returned to Germany after the end of the Nazi dictatorship.

The history of S. Fischer Verlag after 1933 has only been told in fragments so far. When did the Fischer family decide to emigrate? How did Peter Suhrkamp act as trustee of the "Aryanised" part of the publishing house from 1936 onwards? What happened to the Jewish part of the company in exile in Vienna, Stockholm, New York and Amsterdam?

And what ultimately led to the separation of S. Fischer and Suhrkamp? Siegfried Lokatis and Jan-Pieter Barbian use political documents and personal testimonies to trace the turmoil and intrigue and dispel myths that have been perpetuated for decades.

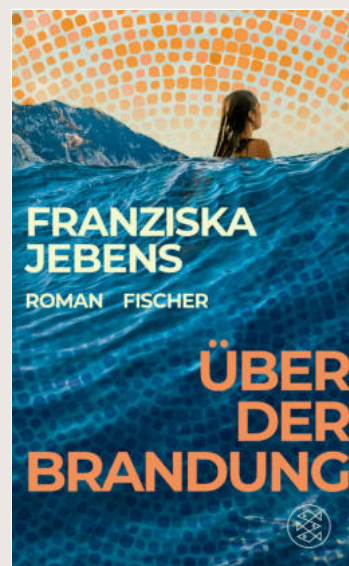

One of these trips took her to the Greek Cyclades. After her bestseller *Always Along the Sea*, she sought distance from everything to reflect on her life so far. In unspoilt nature, right by the sea, she wrote the novel *Above the Waves*, which incorporates many of her insights.

Nea just wants to escape—away from the grey of Berlin, a city that has left its mark on her. Away from a routine life where the woman she longs to be feels like a stranger. As a ghostwriter and co-author, she has written numerous Spiegel bestsellers, including the autobiographies of Natascha Kampusch, Carlos Benede and Monica Lierhaus.

Can there be humanity under inhumane conditions?

Auschwitz 1943: In Block 10, Nazi doctors perform cruel sterilizations on female prisoners. It is not until 1964 that a spectacular trial in London, in which survivors testify, brings the truth to light. The public also learns of the fate of Jewish prisoner doctors such as Dr Maximilian Samuel, who deliberately refrained from performing operations, risking his own life in the process. The book asks us: What would we have done? A deeply moving portrait of the 'grey area' between the instinct for survival and moral responsibility, in which the voices of the victims continue to echo long after.
